# HISTORY



The Village of Monroe was incorporated on September 3, 1817, and became the City of Monroe on March 22, 1837.

The Town Marshals served from 1837 through 1878. An Ordinance was passed on February 13, 1878 to provide for City Police. This ordinance established the Monroe Police Department.

# HISTORY



In 1817, Protection Company No. 1 was located on the public square at Washington Street, facing east, where the Park Hotel was built. They moved across the Street and became Washington Hose No. 1, later known as Germania 1.

On August 27, 1942, the City Council discussed establishing and recognizing the Protection Fire Engine Company No. 1 of the City of Monroe.

Director Chad J. Tolstedt oversees all police and fire operations in the City of Monroe and was appointed in October 2021. Director Tolstedt began his career with the Monroe Police Department in 1999, serving as a Patrol Officer / Public Safety Officer (PSO), PSO Sergeant, PSO Lieutenant, and PSO Captain. While in the department, he served on the Sheriff's Office Special Response Team (SWAT) for 20 years.

He is a graduate of Western Michigan University with a B.A. in Criminal Justice, Spring Arbor University with a Master's Degree in Organizational Management, EMU School of Staff and Command (Class session 30), and the FBI National Academy (Class session 278). Director Tolstedt attended Firefighter I & II training in 2011 and then Fire Officer Leadership Training I, II, and III.

# MONROE PUBLIC SAFETY DEPARTMENT ADMINISTRATION

## Commander Derek Lindsay



Derek Lindsay is the Police Commander for the City of Monroe Department of Public Safety. Appointed Acting Commander in November 2021, he oversees the department's police operations, which include the road patrol division, investigative bureaus, and marine division.

Commander Lindsay has been in law enforcement for over 24 years and has cross-trained as a firefighter since 2011. He has also been a Patrol Officer, Undercover Detective, Vice Detective, Road Patrol Sergeant, Vice Lieutenant, Medical Examiner Investigator, and Detective Captain. He is also considered an Expert in Narcotics Investigations regarding courtroom testimony. Commander Lindsay has also been a SWAT Operator for the MCSO Special Response Team for over 20 years and maintains a supervisory role with that unit.

Commander Lindsay holds a Bachelor's Degree in Criminal Justice from Western Michigan University, attended Firefighter Officer Commander Schools, and graduated from the Eastern Michigan University Staff and Command School.

## Fire Commander Scott Smiley



Scott Smiley is the Fire Commander for the Monroe Public Safety Department for the City of Monroe. He oversees fire operations and all Fire, EMS, and Rescue matters for the City of Monroe. Commander Smiley has been in public service his whole career. He served his country in the U.S. Army for four years, obtaining the rank of Sergeant. Most recently, he has been a career Firefighter and Paramedic for over 23 years, 20 of which have been with the City of Monroe.

Commander Smiley has performed many roles within the Fire Division, including Fire Mechanic, Sergeant, Lieutenant/Inspector, and Captain. He has also been an Arson Investigator and part of the Monroe County Arson Team. As a fire officer, Commander Smiley implemented and was responsible for numerous department programs, including fire safety and public education, a fire extinguisher training program, and a smoke detector program for the city's citizens.

Commander Smiley holds an Associate's Degree from Jefferson Community College in Watertown, New York. He obtained his NFPA Inspector and Plans Review certifications and Arson Investigator certification at the National Fire Academy in Emmitsburg, Maryland. He also attended Firefighter Officer Commander Schools and graduated from the Eastern Michigan University Staff and Command.

## Administrative Commander John "JD" Wall

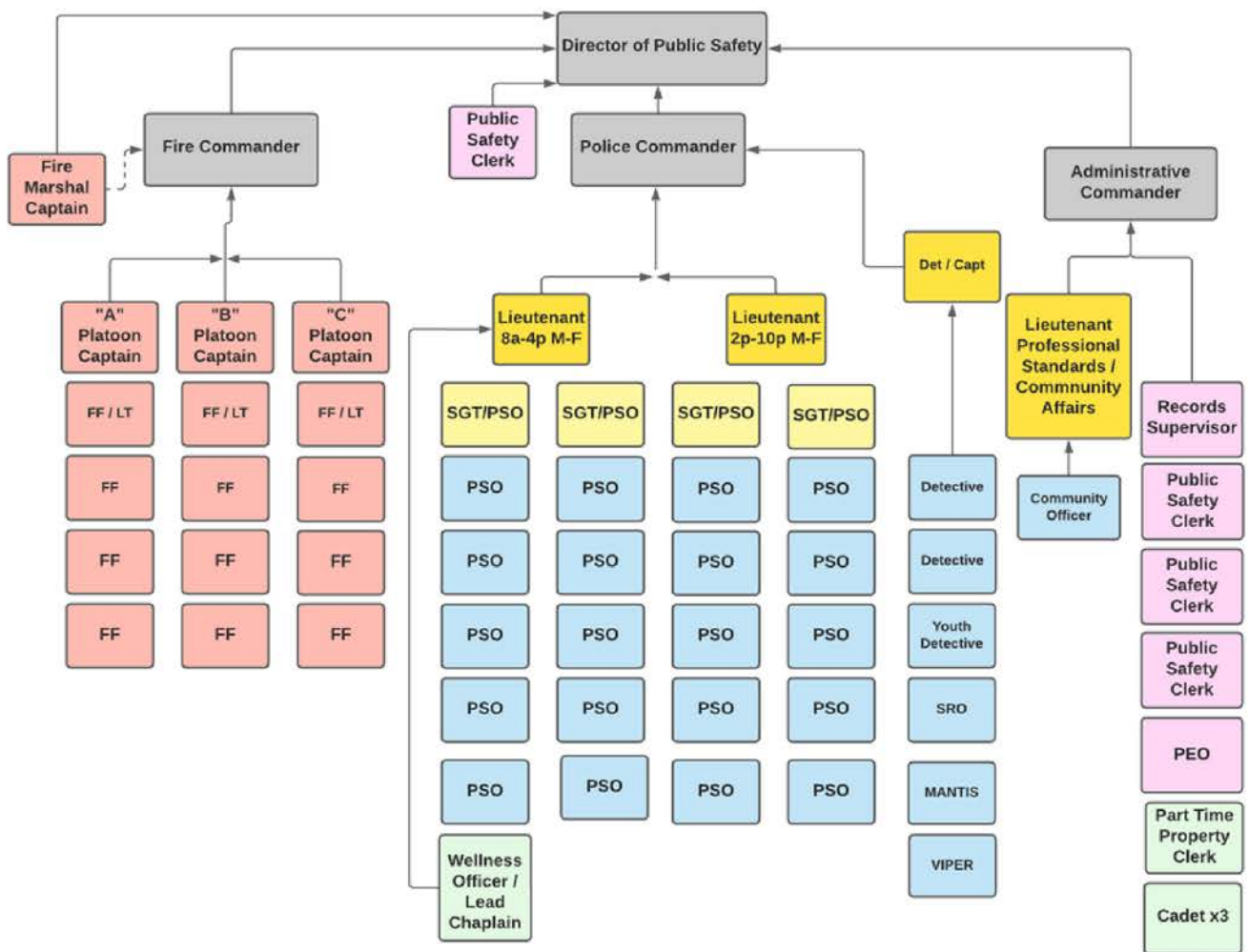


John Wall is the Administrative Commander for the Monroe Public Safety Department and has been with the department since 2000. While serving in the Monroe Police Department, Commander Wall has worked in the Road Patrol, the Detective Bureau, and the Administration. In March 2018, he was promoted to the position of Administrative Captain. Commander Wall's duties include supervising the MPD Records Bureau, Professional Standards, and the Community Officer Division.

Commander Wall's current responsibilities include training, policy management, evidence control and property management, media relations as the Public Information Officer, hiring and recruiting, and compliance control. He is also responsible for FOIA requests, LEIN auditing, scheduling, and operating systems.

Commander Wall graduated from the Eastern Michigan University School of Police Staff and Command Executive Leadership Program. He attended the University of Toledo, Monroe County Community College, and Washtenaw Community College, where he received his degree and attended the police academy. Commander Wall holds several additional licenses and certificates.

# ROAD PATROL



The primary function of the City of Monroe Police Force is its patrol division, which operates 24 hours a day. Police Officers assigned to the Road Patrol respond to calls for service and patrol the City to prevent crime, enforce traffic laws, and enforce criminal laws and City ordinances. In many cases, the officers handle the investigations from beginning to end. Most of the time, officers patrol in vehicles, on foot, and on bicycles.

The Department provides patrol and security services for community areas requiring extra surveillance, including many special events within the city limits. All Road Patrol officers are trained as **Public Safety Officers (PSOs)** who perform the duties of Police Officers and Firefighters.



# PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICER

In 2010, the Monroe Police Department began transitioning to function as a Public Safety Department, sending twelve officers to the Monroe County Regional Fire Academy. The first Public Safety Officers (PSO) officially began duty on August 24, 2011.

A Public Safety Officer (PSO) is a:

- Licensed Police Officer
- Certified in NFPA Fire I&II Academy and HAZ-MAT Operations, which can perform fire suppression duties.

All police officers hired by the City of Monroe Police must be trained or sent to Fire I & II to become fully licensed firefighters in Michigan.

# FIRE SHIFTS



The City of Monroe fire shifts respond to emergency and non-emergency incidents, provide appropriate services, including emergency rescue and fire suppression, search and rescue trapped or injured persons, perform emergency medical and first aid services as needed, and prepare reports regarding emergency incidents as assigned.

The Department provides EMS and Safety services for community areas requiring these functions, including many special events within the city limits.

# COMMUNITY EVENTS

Community Events - What are they?

The Monroe Public Safety Department attends multiple special and community events each year. Community events are planned throughout the City of Monroe or through private organizations for a specific purpose. MPSD's attendance is usually warranted where safety and security are a concern, or having a police and fire presence allows us to engage with the community in a closer, less official setting.

Most scheduled special events have officers and/or firefighters working on such details while on their regular working shifts or who are pre-scheduled to work the event on overtime. Some events listed are worked voluntarily, as these events are time-honored traditions for the agency, or the event is for a charitable cause.





# POLICE COMMUNITY OFFICER PROGRAM

The Monroe Public Safety Department initiated a full-time Community Officer position in 2023 to reach our community robustly. Lieutenant Terese Herrick leads our community officer program. The goals of the MPSD Community Officer(s) are dedicated to attending special events, school functions, community outreach, and directed patrols where needed.

# CHAPLAINCY & EMPLOYEE WELLNESS PROGRAM

The MPSD’s chaplaincy and employee wellness program provides support, assistance, guidance, information, and training to all public safety employees regarding health, wellness, and resiliency.

The chaplaincy program is led by our lead chaplain, David Edwards. His responsibility is to ensure that all mental health and resiliency programs and resources promote positive mental health and well-being in a way that recognizes the unique culture of public safety. He also provides consultation and training to staff, supervisors, and public safety personnel regarding mental health strategies and trends when dealing with the public, providing a mental health perspective on relevant committees, task forces, and workgroups.

Under the leadership of Lead Chaplain David Edwards, volunteer chaplains provide pastoral services to department members (sworn and civilian) and their families, participate in department ceremonies and meetings, accompany enforcement members on duty, and perform other related services.

When requested, they may counsel members and their families, visit sick or injured members, perform wedding ceremonies, and officiate at department funerals. Chaplains can assist members at any time during any tragedy or emergency. The services of a Chaplain may also be made available to residents impacted by crisis events (e.g., accident victims, victims of crime, residents displaced by fire, etc.).

The Police Detective Bureau has six investigators assigned and is overseen by a Detective Captain. Two detectives support road patrol services by investigating crimes exceeding road patrols' investigative abilities. There is also a Juvenile Detective who investigates crimes against minors. Additionally, we have investigators assigned to the Monroe Area Narcotics Team and Investigate Services (MANTIS) drug unit run by the Michigan State Police (MSP), one officer designated as our School Resource Officer (SRO) and serves the schools within the City of Monroe. In 2024, an additional investigator will be assigned to the Monroe County Sheriff's Office (MCSO) Violent Internet Predator & Exploitation Response (VIPER) task force.

In 2023, there were 289 investigations assigned to the Detective Bureau.

# FIRE MARSHAL

In 2023 - Monroe Public Safety Department is proud to announce the return of the position of Fire Marshal to the City of Monroe!

The Fire Marshal is a City of Monroe Public Safety Department—Fire Division member. The Fire Marshal is a liaison to the community. It ensures businesses and citizens are protected through education and enforcement of the fire codes established by the National Fire Protection Association and the International Fire Code.

The Fire Marshal will investigate all fires in the City of Monroe and will also be a Monroe County Fire Investigation Team member. This county-wide team comprises members from different Fire Departments in Monroe County, the City of Monroe Police, the Monroe County Sheriff's Office, the Michigan State Police, and the County Prosecutor's office.

The Fire Marshal is responsible for conducting Fire and Safety inspections for the City of Monroe and investigating the cause and origin of fires in the City in partnership with the City of Monroe Police.

The Marshal will provide fire prevention and promote public education to the City of Monroe citizens by providing fire extinguisher training for businesses, giving fire station tours for organizations that cover what services the fire department offers, and giving fire prevention presentations at the local schools, to name a few examples.

## SPECIAL RESPONSE TEAM (SRT)

Multiple police officers are a part of the Monroe County Sheriff's Office Special Response (SRT), commonly called SWAT.

# SPECIALTY UNITS



## FIRE COORDINATOR

Specially trained and certified as a Fire Instructor Coordinator (IC), this position runs our Fire credentialing program, which is required by the state. It also coordinates all fire training for the Public Safety Division for both Fire and PSO personnel.



## MECHANICS DIVISION

Performs maintenance on Fire apparatus and fire equipment. Keeps trucks up to date by scheduling annual testing and services. Maintains all maintenance records for all vehicles and equipment.



## EMS COORDINATOR

Specially trained and certified as an EMS Instructor Coordinator (IC), this position runs our EMS credentialing for the licensing program. It also coordinates with the state for annual inspections and certifications of Fire Department response vehicles.



## MARINE UNIT

Specially trained fire personnel utilize the department's fire boat to respond to all lake and river rescues.

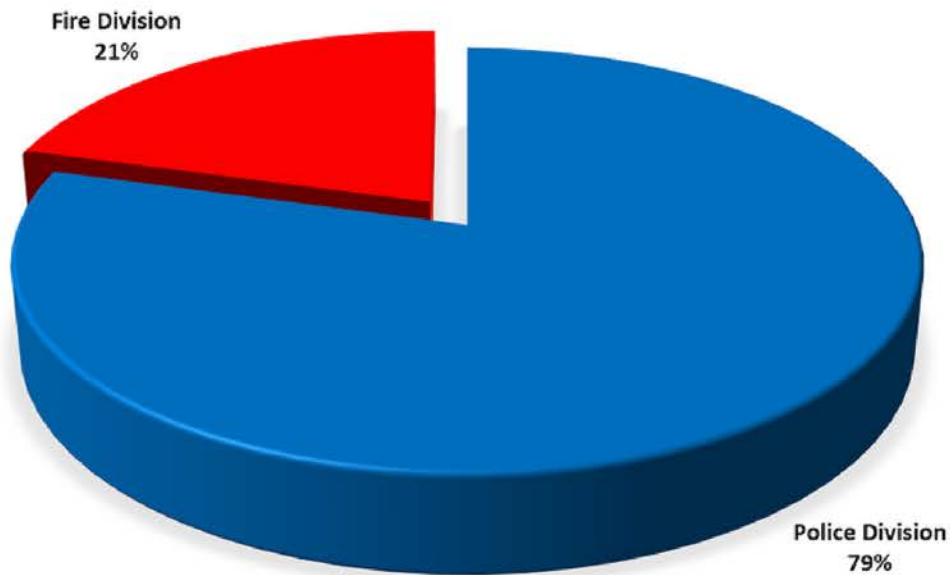

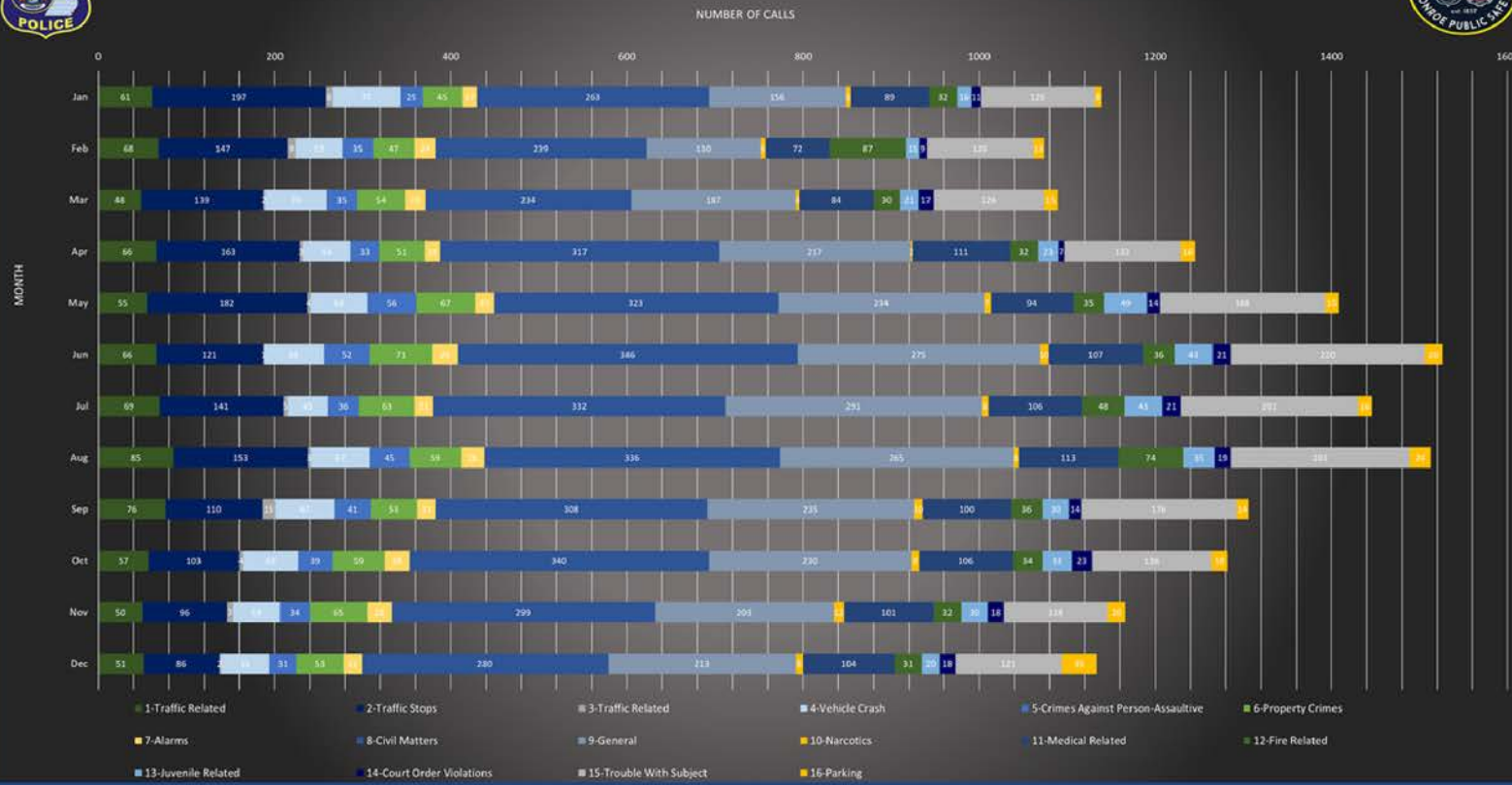
# CALLS FOR SERVICE

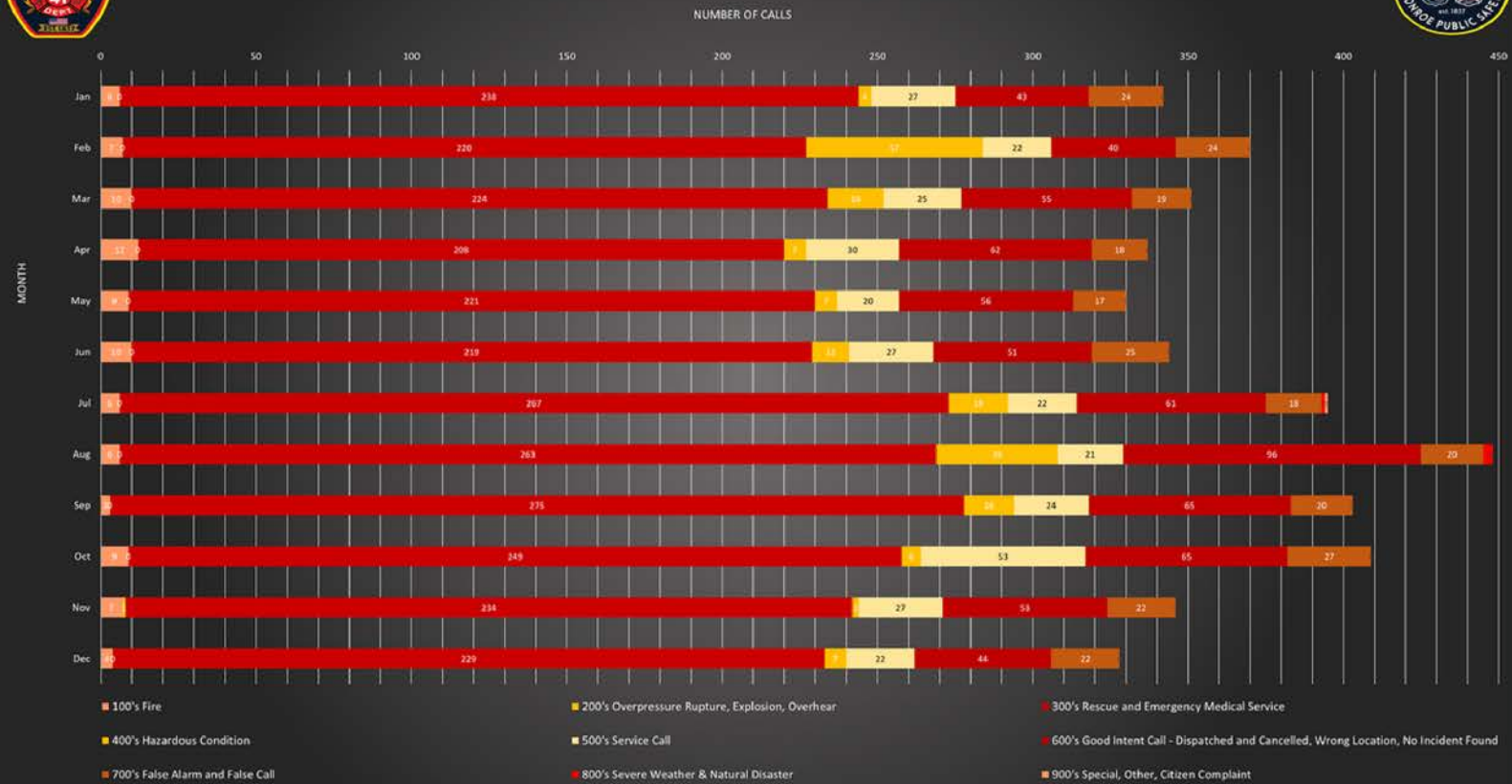

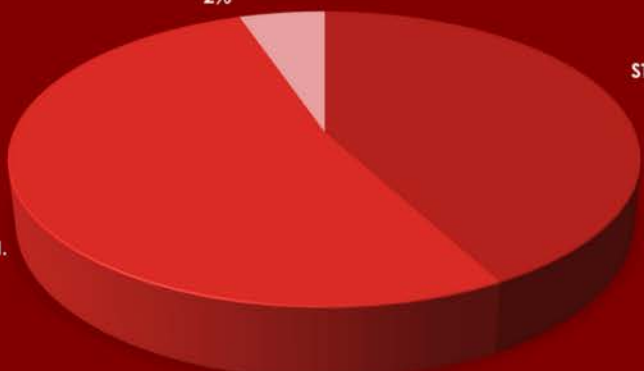

## Internal Investigations Annual Review - 2023

From January 1, 2023, through December 31, 2023, the City of Monroe Police handled or investigated 21 complaints. Of these 21 complaints, 8 were initiated as Citizen Complaints. **THIS is out of 16,000 CFS.** The remaining 13 complaints were internal investigations regarding employee performance deficiencies, policy/procedure infractions, or rules/regulations violations.

- All eight citizen complaints were against the Police Road Patrol.
- No complaints were made for excessive use of force.
- No complaints were made for Biased Influenced Policing.\*

\*Biased-based policing refers to the practices that intentionally use prejudiced judgments based on race, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, economic status, religious beliefs, or age.

### Officer Injury and Exposure Analysis

The City of Monroe Police had one reported exposure and two reported injuries while on duty.

In 2024, the Monroe Public Safety Department contracted with Axon for Body Worn Cameras (BWCs), Fleet Cameras, and TASERS. Axon provides necessary equipment, which has been “tried and true” through field testing, research, and development for many years.

In 2024, the City of Monroe Police is looking to add a K9 back to the Road Patrol.

The Monroe Housing Commission is constructing a Community Services Office on the premises of the Greenwood Townhouses. This will allow Officers to utilize this space, hold meetings, and make the area accessible to our citizens.

We also expect the arrival of Engine 3, which was ordered back in 2021.
